- Name, title, affiliation, e-mail address, phone number of presenting author






Expand Your Reach Through Education

Being trained in Project WILD is a great way to begin incorporating education into your management, research, and restoration work. Project WILD is a national program designed to help both classroom educators and resource professionals teach about habitats, ecosystems, adaptations, biodiversity, cultural perspectives, human impacts on the environment, and wildlife management. All activities utilize a hands-on approach and ask students to be engaged in their learning. Activities are geared to students in grades K-12.
